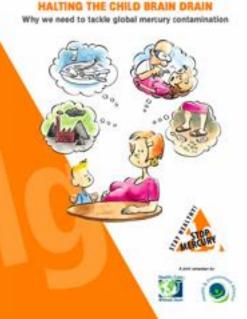

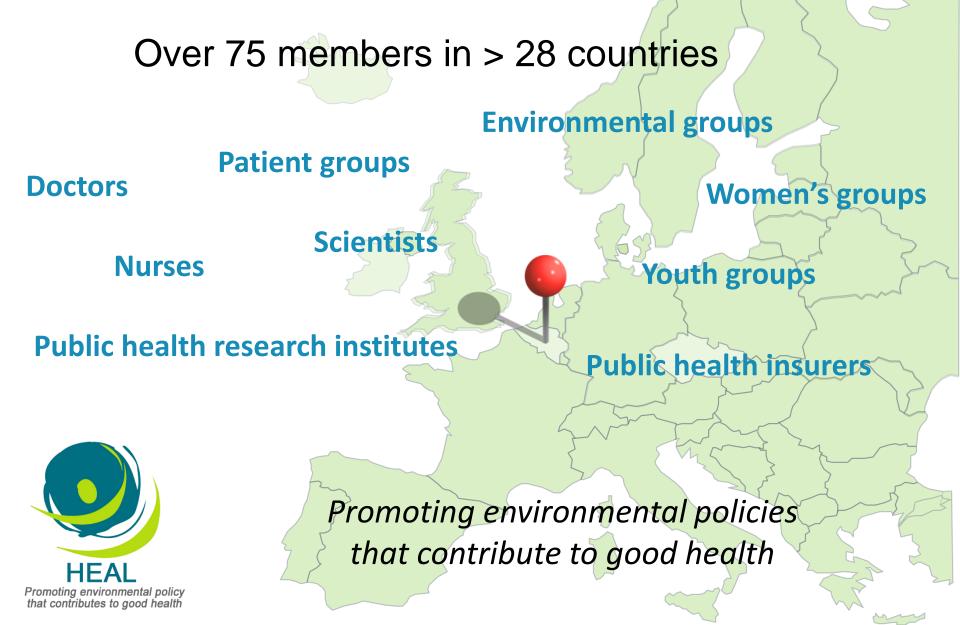
We have strong relationships with our European members and we partner with organisations around the world to raise awareness and share evidence, change laws, and defend and improve people's health and wellbeing.

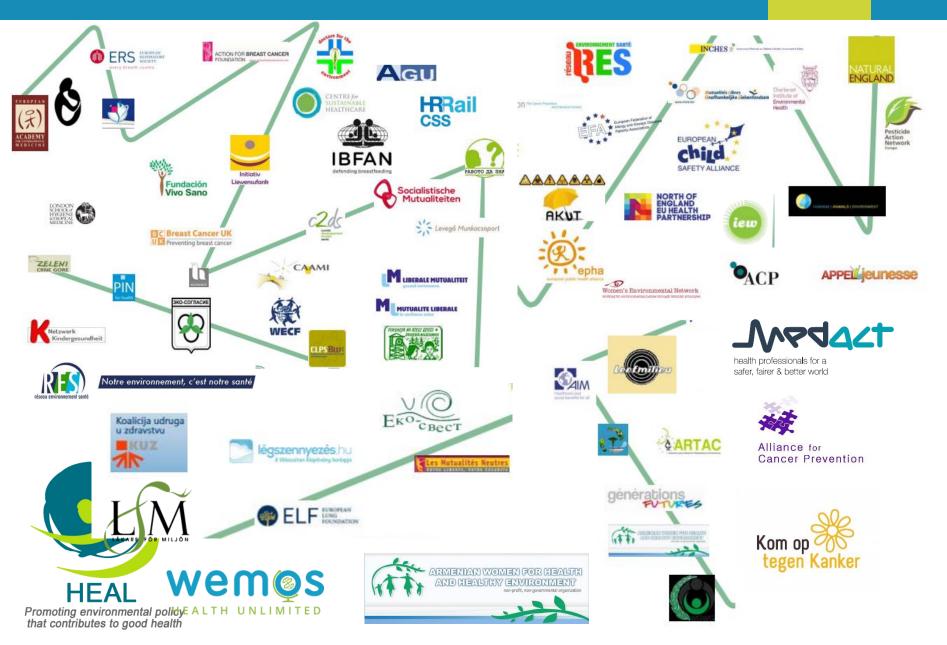

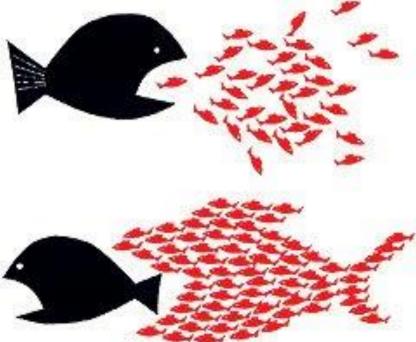

- Sharing scientific, medical, health and economic evidence through effective advocacy



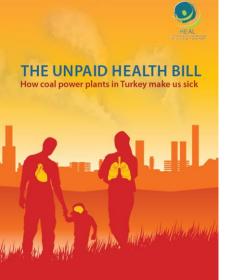

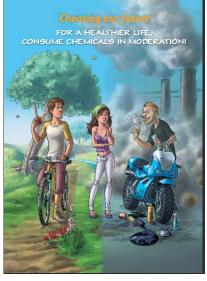

Prevent: Target priorities

Integrate health prevention into environment policy and sustainable development by bringing health science to people and policy makers



- Globally: support 17 Sustainable Development Goals
- Europe:
 - → 2020: a toxic-free future in which chemical production, use and disposal does not harm people and the environment
 - → 2020: phase out of mercury in products building on the Minamata Convention
 - → 2030: air quality in line with recommendations of the World Health Organization
 - → 2040: phase out of coal-fired power plants in the European region
 → 2050: 100% renewable energy in Europe plus other action to
 - tackle climate change building on the 2015 Paris Climate Agreement

A step further towards HEAL Strategic Goals 2015- 2020

Chemicals and EDCs policy – Goals

- Toxic-free environment through comprehensive REACH implementation and EDCs identification in pesticide and industrial chemicals
- Risk assessments of harm to vulnerable groups, incorporation of chemicals mixtures and multiple exposures
- EU wide Human Biomonitoring system, uptake of HBM evidence in EU legislative frameworks, particularly REACH



Chemicals and EDCs policy – Activities

- Public consultations on candidate & priority listing, authorisation and restrictions processes, REACH review
- Advocacy on EDCs identification/criteria process, ECHA's classification of glyphosate, EFSA's review of BPA
- Free online webinars to raise awareness on EU chemicals policy developments
- Testimonies from cancer patients on why they want measures on EDCs, glyphosate and BPA
 - Participation in EU Human Biomonitoring

Climate and energy – Goals

- Paris COP21 climate agreement implementation, ambitious National Climate and Energy Plans
- Public debates on health impacts of climate change at EU level
- Germany: phase out of coal power generation by 2040, energy transition that puts healthy energy choices first
- Poland: public debates on the need to transform the coal-based energy sector



Climate and energy – Activities

- Engage with and mobilise health experts to raise awareness on health costs of coal power generation and advocate for coal phase out
- Briefing on health benefits and risks from wind power
- Advocacy work on the National Climate and Energy Plans
- Campaign highlighting health impacts and costs of fossil fuel subsidies in the EU and worldwide,

Air quality

Goals

- By 2030, air quality (inside and outside) levels in line with WHO air quality guidelines
- Health evidence leading to halting or abandoning new or existing coal power plants
- Poland: enforcement of air quality standards and increased measures at local level for clean air



Activities

- Monitor implementation and advocate for EU policy developments
- Review the Global Commission on Health, Pollution and Development
- Input for the Partnership on air quality, initiated by the Dutch Ministry of Environment
- Toolkit on clean air at local level in Poland
- Collect testimonies (written & oral) from grassroots leaders, doctors, citizens

Better regulation

Goal

 Contribute to EU better regulation by providing examples of inadequate EU legislation implementation for health protection

Activities

- Advocacy for more comprehensive regulation on food contact materials to close health protection gaps
- Input into public consultations as part of EU REFIT/fitness checks
- Work with partners in Better Regulation Watchdog, CHE Health and Environment Alliance Partnership
- Contribute to WHO Sixth Ministerial Conference on Environment and Health as only health stakeholder in WHO environment and health

Goal

 2030 goal of good air quality in the EU and neighbouring countries, such as Serbia and Turkey

Activities

Serbia

- Briefing on national emission reduction plan (NERP)
- Advocacy on Serbian energy strategy, EU progress report
- Health expertise for the Energy Community



 Monitor air quality, climate and energy developments in other Balkan countries Turkey

- Advocacy on EU progress report, air quality, climate, energy and health
- Briefing on health impacts and costs of Turkey's largest coal power complex, Afsin-Elbistan
- Supporting the Right to Clean Act Platform

- World Health Organisation European Environment and Health Process
- Coal as the most polluted fossil fuel
- Fossil fuels subsidies and their health impacts



World Health Organisation European Region

- Since 1989: European Environment and Health Process (EHP)
 - → Process to eliminate the most significant environmental threats to human health
 - → Progress is driven by a series of ministerial conferences held every five years
- 2004: Children's Environment and Health Action Plan for Europe (CEHAPE)
 - ightarrow Focus on safer environments for European children
 - → Act on injuries, contaminated water, air, soil and food, safe and balance nutrition, toxic environments to reduce cancers, respiratory neurodevelopment problems
 - 2010: Parma Declaration

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- First time-bound outcome of the process, setting clear-cut targets to reduce adverse health impact of environmental threats in next decade
 - June 2017: Sixth Ministerial Conference on Environment and Health in Czech Republic

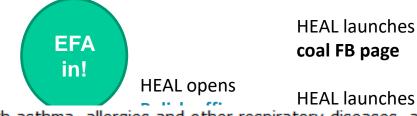
European Union

- 2003: 2004-2010 Environment and Health Action Plan (EHAP)
 - → Reduce the disease burden caused by environmental factors in the EU, identify and prevent new health threats caused by environmental factors and strengthen EU capacity for policy-making
 - \rightarrow 13 concrete actions and 3 working groups with stakeholders



Air quality, energy and climate change

• **Coal** responsible for more than 18,200 premature deaths, about 8,500 new cases of chronic bronchitis, and over 4 million lost working days each year



"For patients with asthma, allergies and other respiratory diseases, air pollution can have severe consequences, imposing limitations on their daily lives, restricting their activities outdoors and even resulting in days off from work. Policymakers should use every opportunity to create an environment that is free from the burden of air pollution, with looking at the health implications of coal consumption being one of them."
